Humane Society of Huron Valley Experiences Large Overflow of Dogs

(Ann Arbor) – The Humane Society of Huron Valley Cruelty Investigation Department is in the process of rescuing approximately 30 dogs and 5 rabbits. The animals will have to be housed at the shelter or in foster care homes until they are adopted.

“We are already at capacity with homeless dogs and cats available for adoption—over 100 right now. We just don’t have the space for this number of incoming animals at one time. It will be a huge strain on the shelter. But, unfortunately, this is the nature of our business. We will do what we can to make room, and ensure they get good care. These seem to be wonderful dogs. We are hoping that there are people in the community ready to give these animals loving homes,” says Tanya Hilgendorf, Executive Director.

“These are pure bred dogs and puppies--Schnauzer’s, Terriers, and Pomeranians. Other than needing a bath, they appear to be in good shape. They are healthy and should be up for adoption by Saturday or Sunday,” says Julie Cutis, Cruelty Investigator.

Anyone interested in adopting should come to the shelter. We are open every day from noon to 6pm.
