

GO FUR FREE



Please help end fur farming.

Across the globe, approximately 100 million animals are bred and killed for their fur annually. This includes 3.1 million in the U.S. Most of this fur is used in the fashion industry. It is estimated that the fur from about half of the animals killed goes to suppling fur trim for items like coats, hats, gloves and shoes.

More than 95% of the fur sold every year comes from animals bred, raised and killed on fur farms. These animals spend their days in small, cramped wire cages, generally with several other animals. A typical fur farm mink cage measures between 1-1.5 feet in height, 8 inches to 1 foot wide and 2-3 feet deep. In the wild, mink are highly active and have a home range of approximately 3-6 miles. Confined to these cages, animals are unable to perform their basic natural behaviors. The inability to act naturally causes many animals to suffer from mental distress and exhibit stereotypies like pacing, repetitive circling and self-mutilation. While death may be a relief for animals living on a fur farm, this process is far from humane. In order to keep the pelts of these animals intact, the most common methods for killing are gassing and electrocution.

As with factory farming and wet markets, there are always serious public health implications when animals are kept in cramped, overcrowded confinement. The public was recently outraged when Denmark culled 17 million mink related to COVID 19 — perhaps not realizing these animals were all destined to die miserably regardless. It's time for this totally unnecessary cruelty, waste and public health risk to end.

Concerns over animal welfare have provoked many places like the UK to outright ban fur farming. Similarly, many clothing designers and producers have committed to being fur free. Fur Free Alliance maintains a list of fur-free retailers here.

CO-EXIST WILDLY



Thank you for caring about wildlife animals!

Sadly, Ann Arbor continues to shoot healthy deer (the City is now in its fifth year of a four-year plan) due to human/animal conflict. But there are plenty of ways to coexist that are easy, humane and effective in reducing conflict and supporting alf wildlife. For instance:

· Prevention is key

- Prevent animals from taking up residence in your home.
- Put a (secure) lid on it Make sure garbage and compost is not
- Don't invite them to dinner Plant deer-resistant gardens, keep bird feeders out of reach of deer, and use a feeder with a seed catcher.
 Consider using birdseed that birds like but others find unappealing like Safflower seed and Nyjer seed.
- Adopt a dog (or two!) Check out those currently available for adoption.

Patience is a virtue

- Give them a brake When driving, brake for wildlife and remain alert for animal crossings especially around dawn and dusk.
- Be careful of baby animals, particularly in the spring and summer.

Living with wildlife

Love them or not, urban wildlife are here to stay. While some call them a "nuisance;" the truth is that wildlife are a lot like us. Their intention isn't to invade our yards or homes, but simply to find food to eat, a warm place to sleep, and a safe place to raise their babies.

Fortunately, for most of us, they are an enjoyable part of our community! With human land development increasing and animals losing their natural habitats at an alarming rate, finding ways to co-exist with our wild neighbors and promote their well-being is more important now than ever.

More and more communities are helping residents to learn about and live peacefully among wildlife. In fact, cities as large as New York have launched coedisting with wildlife campaigns, including a non-lethal deer management program.

You can help! There are plenty of easy, humane and effective ways to reduce conflict and create a more compassionate world for animals. From actions at home to advocacy with public officials for nonviolent solutions and community ducation programs, your pledge to take steps to peacefully coexist can make a huge difference!

Declaw Bill Action Alert

Dear Wendy,

Help protect Michigan's cats by asking your State Representative to co-sponsor the bill banning painful declaw surgeries.


Representative Nate Shannon is introducing legislation next week; if it becomes law, Michigan would lead the nation—becoming the second state after New York—to outlaw this cruel and unnecessary mutilation. But he needs co-sponsors from both parties, and that's where you come in.

<u>Please contact your State Representative</u> to ask them to co-sponsor the bill.

Some mistakenly think declawing is harmless, surgical removal of nails, but declawing actually removes toe bones—resulting in both short-term and chronic pain and other well-documented health issues. We've witnessed this in our shelter; declawed cats often have physical and behavioral problems that are a secondary response to pain and to the stress of losing their natural and important need to scent mark. Declawing cats does not protect them from relinquishment; rather, it puts them at greater risk to be turned in to a shelter because of the resulting problems. Furthermore, the CDC and National Institutes of Health agree declawing cats to protect humans is "not advised." See more about the issues from declawing here.

Based on research showing clear detrimental effects, both the American Association of Feline Practitioners (AAFP) and the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) are against declawing as an elective procedure. It is also illegal in numerous countries and cities, and it is opposed by all major animal welfare organizations.

Please take a second to email your representative letting them know declawing must stop, and the great state of Michigan can lead the way in protecting our companion animals.


What do you really know about skunks?



In 2020, 126 dogs left the shelter on Pajama Parties and 90 of them turned into adoptions!










Updates to Our Greeter Position!



New Behavior Developments in 2020

- Having to adjust to COVID helped us learn new ways to provide training and education opportunities for volunteers.
- Using the Zoom platform allows us to record continuing education presentations so volunteers can watch them at any time – don't have to attend live.
- Lecture portions of Blue Dot and Holding trainings are recorded on Zoom to be viewed beforehand, enabling us to spend more time doing hands-on training when in person.

Improved Play Group Protocols

- Updated training and protocols to follow recommendations from Shelter Playgroup Alliance
- Now following "least intrusive, minimally aversive" standards of practice to improve safety and behavioral well-being of all the dogs involved.
- Training recording available to anyone seeking to become a play group handler.



Head Start Changes

- Reduced size of Head Start teams to enable more training time per dog.
- Developed more education materials for volunteers including a Head Start manual, videos, and a Zoom training on nose work.

Volunteers Helping in Creative Ways

Sheeva

- Came to us pregnant, and very scared
- After raising her pups, was ready to look for a home of her own, but was very fearful meeting new people initially.
- Multiple volunteers helped us out with desensitization sessions at the shelter and in foster to get Sheeva used to meeting new people.
- Able to meet and be adopted by a happy family in January!

Happenings in the Cat World in 2020

It was a slower year for intakes, but the hard work continued!

- We were able to send more shy and cage aggressive cats to foster than ever before, and found great success at finding them homes from foster
- We maintained multiple Blue Dot communal rooms at once
- We saw our cats be adopted very quickly, which is a testament to your hard work helping them to feel safe and confident!
- We sent entire cruelty cases to foster, including one group of over 20 cats, this has never been possible before!

By the Numbers


- Rescue took in over 1,200 wildlife.
- 869 had to be euthanized (we continue to see a lot of distemper).
- 325 wildlife made it to rehab!
- Our new rescue vehicle is amazing and incredibly helpful for large cruelty seizures.

We have lost some of our rehabbers, so this year, a larger number of wildlife will need to go to Howell and rehabbers that are further out. Volunteers continue to play a very important role in transporting them so our personnel can stay available for other sick, injured and orphaned animals. Thank you!



Animal Cruelty Cases

- CR wrote and responded to 8 search warrants.
- 340 animals were seized during those search warrants.
- 11 warrant requests were submitted to the prosecutors office.
- Looking forward to an improved relationship with the new prosecutor, Eli Savit.

TNR: Overall Numbers for 2020

- Biggest increase in cats that were adopted out from being in colonies, up just over 200% for adoption!
- A lot of the adoptions came from socializing kittens born to feral moms
- Just under 1,600 TNR sterilizations, and just over 1,900 cats overall went through the TNR program
- Helped over 100 additional cats with non-S/N medical care due to our policy to increase long term care for TNR cats



Feral Kitten Fostering:

- Started a small special foster group for unsocial "feral" kittens
- Have been able to socialize about 30 kittens for adoption this way in 2020
- Learned a lot about ways to increase socialization efforts from our volunteers
- Will have more volunteer fosters going into 2021



TNR Trapping Calendar

- Got all of our regular trappers onto our new calendar system
- No more surprise days with to many TNR cats!
- Maximized our open TNR days
- Only TNR 14 days a month
- Typical TNR day would be 10-15 cats






