Special Instructions/Comments:

There are multiple reasons to do an exploratory in animals, but the two most common are to investigate the possibility of internal masses or other abnormalities that are affecting the health of the animal, and/or to see if the animal has eaten something abnormal that is causing discomfort and other serious symptoms such as lethargy, inappetence, or vomiting.

Post-operative diet may need to be changed if the diagnosis is a foreign body ingestion. This will most likely consist of a very limited diet, and possibly a gentle prescription gastrointestinal food to ensure no further GI upset. The veterinarian or surgeon attending your case will give further instructions on any potential diet changes after surgery. If the exploratory surgery did not result with a definitive diagnosis, diet may likely remain unaffected.
